#### PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Happy New Year!!! The officers and Board of Directors of DSSA would like to wish everyone a happy and prosperous new year. One of our resolutions is to do everything possible to keep the duly elected folks in the Puzzle Palace, otherwise known as the Delaware General Assembly, from enacting more unconstitutional and ineffective "gun safety" legislation.

We have our work cut out for us. The crazy stuff has already begun. As you are aware, SS1 for SB 2, "Permit to Purchase", had been in the House Appropriations Committee since passing the Senate back in January of 2023. During a Democratic Caucus meeting on Wednesday, January 3<sup>rd</sup>, the bill was signed out of Committee by the 4 democrats on the Committee. Neither of the 2 Republicans on the committee had any idea there was even a meeting of the committee, which there wasn't. No notice of any committee meeting was published.

Remember, Attorney General Kathleen Jennings said back in July of 2023, that Permit to Purchase would be passed by the House and signed by the Governor the first week of the 2024 session.

That did not happen and due to the "procedural" mixup, the bill will not be considered until March at the earliest. At least that is what we have been told.

So, the games have begun. I have promised that if that bill is signed by the Governor, DSSA will file a lawsuit that day or the next day. We know it is unconstitutional. DSSA has been trying to advise the attorneys in the Geneal Assembly of that fact and pointed to several similar cases, especially in Maryland, where permits to purchase have been deemed unconstitutional.

Stayed tuned. On a brighter note a bill has been introduced in the House that would legalize Sunday hunting for game birds. We believe, with the number of sponsors, that it will pass both chambers. This is something DSSA has been fighting for years to get. Sunday deer hunting has been a tremendous success with no problems.

The lawsuits challenging the semi-auto ban and magazine capacity ban are scheduled for oral arguments before a three

judge panel of the Third Circuit of Appeals in Philadelphia the beginning of March. The challenge to the under 21 ban is pending in Superior Court, Kent County. DSSA has filed a motion for summary judgment in the past week. We are waiting for the states answer.

## Bloomberg Lauds The Gun Violence Archive For Its Pretend Data

The long-debunked nonprofit is facing financial concerns and the loss of its founder

Whenever Bloomberg BusinessWeek writes about firearms or the Second Amendment it's forced to disclose to readers that its owner is rabidly anti-gun.

No one has spent more of their personal wealth to infringe upon the Second Amendment than former New York City mayor Michael Bloomberg. So, when the topic is guns, his mainstream newswire adds a strange disclaimer, which labels the work as propaganda for the boss, not news:

"Michael Bloomberg, founder and majority owner of Bloomberg BusinessWeek parent Bloomberg LP, also founded Everytown for Gun Safety, which advocates gun-safety measures." In a recent story titled "Tallying the Best Stats on US Gun Violence Is Trauma of Its Own," BusinessWeek extolls the alleged virtues of the long-debunked Gun Violence Archive, which is the legacy media's favorite source of sensational, misleading and inaccurate mass-shooting data.

The puffery is strong in this piece. The author, Madison Muller, who usually writes about weight-loss drugs, is clearly trying to prop up the foundering GVA. BusinessWeek is not the first media outlet to jump to the GVA's defense. Last year CNN defended the Washington D.C.-based nonprofit from serious allegations raised in a special report by the Second Amendment Foundation's Investigative Journalism Project, which GVA founder and executive director, Mark Bryant, dismissed as "irrelevant."

Bloomberg's recent story is best defined by what it doesn't say. There is no serious discussion of GVA's loose, all-inclusive definition of a mass shooting, which states that anytime four or more people are shot or even wounded, the GVA rings the mass-shooting bell. Unlike the FBI, Bryant's team does not exclude anything. Even if the shooting is drug or gang related, which are the two main causes of shooting deaths in the country, the GVA counts it. The nonprofit also includes shootings that are self-defense or the result of domestic violence.

Using Bryant's all-inclusive definition, the GVA claims there were 417 mass shootings in 2019. The FBI says there were 30, because it uses a much narrower and realistic definition. This year, the GVA claims there have been more than 72,000 shootings, of which 636 were mass shootings — an average of more than 1.7 per day.

Citing debunked stats, Muller claims no federal agency tracks mass shootings, which she wrongly considers a publichealth crisis, so the GVA fills a necessary niche.

"Data is siloed, which makes it difficult to study a publichealth crisis that kills more kids annually than cancer, drug overdoses or car accidents," the story states.

She points out there is a culprit responsible for this "lack of transparency." It's the NRA's fault, of course.

"The National Rifle Association successfully lobbied lawmakers to pass a provision in annual appropriations legislation that for years prevented US health agencies from collecting data on shootings," she wrote, adding that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the National Institutes of Health would be far better arbiters of mass shooting data.

#### Anti-gun

Bloomberg claims Bryant is not anti-gun.

"They want to remain as nonpartisan as possible. 'We do stats, not advocacy,' Bryant says. And though he says he's 'not even remotely for banning weapons,' he wants to see policies enacted that could help reduce deaths, such as the

safe-storage requirements and child-access-prevention laws that public-health experts have widely endorsed," Muller wrote.

This is bunk.

In a previous interview with the Second Amendment Foundation's Investigative Journalism Project, Bryan revealed himself to be extremely anti-gun.

Asked if he supported the Second Amendment, Bryant said, "I do, as it's written, but I have a problem in the way people look at the last half and not the first half and parse that. If anyone is looking at the whole amendment, and I say this in interviews often, I don't have the balls to tell someone how to defend themselves. My job is statistics, not opinion."

Mark Bryant, 68, is founder and executive director of the Gun Violence Archive.

Bryant has tried to claim he is "anti-violence" and not antigun but has publicly lobbied for stricter gun control.

In 2018, he coauthored a guest column for the Los Angeles Times, titled: "Op-Ed: We have all the data we need: Stronger gun laws would save lives." The column was coauthored with Devin Hughes, founder of GVPedia, which according to its website is a "project created to provide ready access to academic research and high-quality data on gun violence."

In their column, Bryant and Hughes called for more antigun legislation, stating: "More guns mean more crime and more death. Gun possession significantly increases your risk of being killed by someone you know. A gun in the home doubles your risk of homicide and triples your risk of suicide. The presence of a gun increases the lethality of domestic violence. Areas with higher gun ownership see a significant increase in burglary. And states with higher levels of gun ownership experience higher rates of firearm fatalities."

Asked about the column, which bore his byline, Bryant said, "I didn't write that. I don't even know what Devin (Hughes) wrote in that."

Bryant also said he supports restricting standard-capacity magazines.

"I think magazine capacity is an issue that should be addressed. You don't need 30-round mags or a 60-round drum," he said. "While they are great 'get off' tools, they're part of a hobby, not part of the Second Amendment."

#### **Funding concerns**

Whenever the legacy media defends the GVA, the question to ask is why now? Muller concedes in her story that the nonprofit needs a more reliable funding source.

It costs around \$800,000 to operate the GVA annually, she points out, and the GVA has only one source of funding, an 81-year-old billionaire named Michael Klein, who runs a real estate information company.

Both Klein and Bryant acknowledge, Muller wrote, "that they need to figure out how to secure long-term funding and how to provide leadership for the GVA for the future."

#### **Takeaways**

Today, it appears that the nonprofit may be facing hard financial times, and Bryant is looking for a replacement so he can retire. This must terrify the legacy media, because they could lose their number-one source of overblown, fictional mass-shooting numbers.

CNN has cited GVA data, as have CNN, MSNBC, CBS, ABC, The New York Times, the Washington Post, USA Today and FOX News.

The GVA has become one of Joe Biden's favorite weapons in his war against law-abiding gun owners. He has cited GVA data in dozens of speeches.

The only good thing about the Gun Violence Archive is that once you see its data cited in a story, you can stop reading. The article is a work of fiction. The GVA has become the ultimate red-flag for discerning readers.

Today, Vice President Harris is launching the Biden-Harris Administration's Safer States Initiative to provide states with additional tools and the support they need to reduce gun violence and save lives. To kick off the initiative, the White House is releasing the Biden-Harris Safer States Agenda, outlining key actions states should take, including:

- Establishing a State Office of Gun Violence Prevention;
- Investing in evidence-informed solutions to prevent and respond to gun violence, including community violence interventions, Crime Gun Intelligence Centers, and implementation of Extreme Risk Protection Orders;
- Strengthening support for survivors and victims of gun violence;
- Reinforcing responsible gun ownership, including by requiring safe storage of firearms and reporting of lost and stolen firearms;
- Strengthening gun background checks, including by enacting universal background checks legislation and removing
- Holding the gun industry accountable, including by banning assault weapons and high-capacity magazines

and <u>enacting firearm-specific liability laws</u> to ensure that victims of gun violence have their day in court.

To help states advance this agenda, the Justice Department is announcing two new executive actions to reduce gun violence.

- Safe Storage Model Legislation.
- Lost and Stolen Firearms Reporting Model Legislation.

In the months ahead, the White House Office of Gun Violence Prevention will continue to proactively work with states to make sure they have additional resources and support needed to advance these agenda items.

We are more vocally involved in standing for the constitution than we have been in decades. This centuries old government charter was designed to ensure all voices had a seat at the table, and we aren't giving it up any time soon.

## Just What <u>IS</u> High Power Rifle Competition? (...and how do I get started?)

I am glad you asked! I hope that I can shed a little bit of light on the subject, and really hope that I can talk you into coming out to join us! It can be more than a little intimidating to think about coming out to a rifle match (especially your first one), but a little information will help you over the hump. We are extremely fortunate here in Delaware, in that we have the ability to shoot at distances from 200 to 1000 yards at the Bridgeville Rifle and Pistol Club. We are also

fortunate to have a whole bunch of really great (and highly talented) people to shoot with! Whether you are interested in F-Open, F-T/R, or conventional shooting, you will find that the folks on our firing line are generally friendly, knowledgeable, and super-helpful (you might want to give those shooters some space when they are preparing to shoot though...). Moving on...

First off, highpower competition comes in a few broad forms, basically Across the Course competition (sometimes called XTC), Mid-Range Prone, and Long-Range prone. All are shot with centerfire rifles in various calibers; some with semi-auto rifles such as AR-15's, and others with bolt-action rifles.

There are certainly variations on a theme, but for the purposes of this article, I am going to focus on Mid-Range Prone completion, as it is the most accessible to the new competition shooter. Mid-range matches are held at distances ranging from 300 to 600 yards, and as the name implies are shot from the prone (on your belly) position. The four basic rifle types used in these matches are;

- 1. Sling supported or conventional rifles
- 2. F-T/R rifles
- 3. F-Open rifles
- 4. AR-Tactical rifles

Right now, in your gun safe, you probably have a rifle that would fit somewhere in the categories mentioned above. It might not be ideal, and it probably isn't perfect, but it might be good enough to get started without spending a bunch of money right away. So, with that said...

I am going to start with AR-Tactical rifles: –in a nutshell, you need:

- Any semi-automatic rifle in an AR-Platform, any caliber from .223/5.56 to .308/7.62
- Standard box magazine in 10, 20, or 30 round capacity
- 4-½ pound minimum trigger pull (essentially a 'service rifle' trigger)
- MAXIMUM 20" barrel (or shorter)
- MAXIMUM 15 Power scope
- Total weight of 14 pounds or less

AR-Tactical class is really the 'easy button' for getting involved in match shooting. Many folks out there have one (or more). BUT –you must remember the restrictions that have been placed upon these rifles by the Delaware Legislature since June 30, 2022, and not run afoul of the law. At any rate, AR-Tactical rifles are generally shot off of a 'Harris' type bipod with a soft rear bag (no eared bag), though 'field expedient' support such as a backpack or shooting bag may be used.

For F-T/R rifles, you are restricted to .223 Remington or .308 Winchester ONLY, with no limit on bullet weight. Your rifle may be semi-auto or bolt action. You are also weight restricted to 18.18 pounds, including the bipod. These rifles are shot from bipods, ranging from a Harris type, to much more elaborate setups (but still bipods). A rear 'eared' bag is

also allowed. Scopes are the norm here, with no limit to power or type.

In F-Open rifles, the sky is the limit (within reason). Here too, you may use a semi-auto or bolt action rifle (though the bolt actions dominate). The rifle weight is restricted to 10 kilograms (about 22 pounds) with no restriction on caliber, bullet weight, or scope power. These rifles are generally shot from front rests, with eared rear bags. At first glance, many F-Open rifles look a lot like a benchrest rifle (at least to me).

For 'conventional' rifles, any caliber is OK, as long as you can support it with your elbows and a sling. Scopes and 'iron sights' are both in common use. Conventional rifles can be semi-auto rifles like an AR-15 or M1A, or bolt action rifles. There are a few further restrictions possible when you hear about 'Palma' rifles. Similarly to F-T/R, these rifles are restricted to .223 Remington or .308 Winchester ONLY, and are further restricted to 'iron' sights (no optics).

Once you have your rifle in hand, you will also need a shooting mat or a blanket to lie on and enough ammo to shoot 60 record shots plus sighting shots (think about ~75 rounds). If you are shooting a conventional rifle, you might want a heavy sweatshirt and/or some elbow pads to help you get through the day (elbow pads couldn't hurt in F-Class either). If you are shooting on electronic targets, you don't need too much else to get started. If you are shooting on manual (pull) targets, you will need a spotting scope or binoculars to 'spot' the shot markers in the target.

What can you expect when you show up to a match? Well, the first thing you need to do is register for the match. The match director will need your name, address and email, an NRA number if you have one, and the match fee. While you are registering, tell him (or her) that you are a first time competitor. As a first timer, you will likely be paired with a more experienced shooter, and you will shoot in the Master class. Don't worry though. Once you have fired your first match, you will be placed in a classification according to your ability. For conventional and AR-Tactical the classification scores are (expressed as percentages):

#### **INDIVIDUAL MID-RANGE PRONE**

High Master	98.50 and above
Master	97.00 to 98.49
Expert	94.50 to 96.99
Sharpshooter	92.00 to 94.49
Marksman	Below 92.00

For F-Class competitors the classification scores are:

#### **INDIVIDUAL F-CLASS**

High Master	98.00 and above
Master	96.50 to 97.99
Expert	94.00 to 96.49
Sharpshooter	91.50 to 93.99
Marksman	Below 91.49

Tracking your progress from Marksman up through the ranks is part of the fun, and part of the goal setting (and attaining) process.

Once you are all registered you will be assigned a target number and a relay. Most all matches are shot in a relay format, with the 1<sup>st</sup> relay shooting first, 2<sup>nd</sup> relay shooting second, and so on. Generally your duties are shooting, scoring, and resting, though you may be required to 'pull targets' on manual target ranges. At Bridgeville we use electronic targets, so no pit duty!

For the most part, if you do what the match director asks, you will have no problems, and your shooting partners (squad mates) will help you if you have questions –better to ask than do something unsafe or ill-advised, for sure! During the course of a typical match, you will shoot your sighting shots, adjusting your scope or sights to get your shot impacts into the middle of the target. Often times you will have unlimited sighting shots on your first target. After you are 'sighted in' you will begin your record shots (usually twenty). The matches are timed, with mid-range matches generally requiring that your sighting shots and 20 record shots be fired within 22 minutes. For a first timer, this can be stressful, but it gets better after you do it a time or two. Once you get your first record shot off, the rest is like falling off a log in comparison. You have done the hard part and shown up to the match! Congratulations and Welcome! You are now a Competitor!

Once you have completed firing, you will generally be asked to keep score for the next competitor on your target. Again, asking for help is recommended and easy to do. It is good form to pay some attention, and try to be where you are supposed to be when the line is called 'Hot'. It is also very important to pay attention to your shooter when you are scoring him (or her). You are in charge of keeping your shooter safe, so it is important to stay awake and aware.

Once you have completed your three strings of fire, the match is mostly over. All that remains is putting away the targets, and going to lunch with some new friends to discuss how you can do better the next time—and there WILL be a next time.

I really do hope to see some new faces on the line next year when our matches start. We truly have some great people and great shooters on the firing line; all we need now is YOU.

Guest Speaker Stephen P. Halbrook, JD, PhD
